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Sr Ann Kiely FMDM

Please pray for the soul of our dear Sister Ann Kiely who died very peacefully in Franciscan Convent, Ballinasloe, County Galway, Ireland on 2nd March 2017.

A Requiem Mass was celebrated on Saturday 4th March followed by the burial in Creagh Cemetery, Ballinasloe.

May she rest in everlasting peace.



Sr Ann Kiely (Sr Gertrude) began her FMDM life in Ballinasloe in 1955. She was sent to England for Novitiate, first profession and teacher training. Sr Ann was now equipped to be missioned by the Lord to **"....go out and bear fruit, fruit that will last"**

At the age of twenty-two Sr Anne was one of the four pioneer Sisters who bravely set off for Nathalia to establish a primary Catholic school in Nathalia named St Mary of the Angels.

St Mary of the Angels was blessed to have Sr Ann for twenty-five years (1961-1986), eight of which she was Principal (1978-1986), before leaving Australia to continue her work as a missionary in Zimbabwe. Sr Ann continued to take a keen interest in St Mary of the Angels, with her last visit to the College in 2011 for our 50th year Reunion.

Ann was responsible for many initiatives with the assistance of her dedicated staff and Board members. To mention three of them, one, the setting up the private bus system which facilitated many more students to attend the College. The second was the liaison and cooperation between Nathalia College and St Mary's, both of which benefit our students. In 1977 to better facilitate the education of all students who were then at St Mary of the Angels P-12, St Francis School was established as a separate entity on the same campus.

Sr Ann wrote in her final report as Principal:

".....On my first visit to Nathalia. I wondered if I had reached the end of the earth. It was December, 1960, hot, dry, dusty, and as we travelled up from Bendigo, the road seemed to go on and on through countryside which tempted me to question again whether or not Galileo was wrong. Perhaps, at least, some parts of the world were in fact flat....."

"I thank God for the spirit which has prevailed over the years. The first St Mary of the Angels was one of St Francis' favourite places because it was such a happy place. Thanks to the calibre of students, staff, parents, clergy and all who have been involved, my memories of this place are also happy ones."

*"Whilst my heart is full of gratitude to all who have been part of my life for the past 25 years, I cannot help feeling a twinge of sadness as I leave Nathalia behind.....
..I will miss this sunburnt country and its beautiful, friendly people, but the future lies in the hands of the one who has guided me in the past."*

- 2** Collect evidence - copy URLs or take screenshots of the material

- 4** Block the person and talk to someone you trust

KEEPING YOUR KIDS SAFE ONLINE IS EASY WITH A FEW SIMPLE PRECAUTIONS.

1. Nothing replaces parental supervision and education for kids about cybersafety.
2. Set a technology curfew.
3. Remind your child to never give out identifying information such as your home address, school name or telephone number in a public message such as chat or newsgroups.
4. If your child posts photos online, use privacy settings to limit access to people they know well.
5. Remind your child that people don't always tell the truth online, and they can't take anything at face value.
6. Reassure your child that they can tell you anything, without fear of losing the laptop or internet access.
7. If they get a message or email that's threatening or rude, they should 'STOP, BLOCK, TELL'. First step is to tell your child to stop responding to the abuse and then block those people sending threatening or rude messages if they continue. Let your child know that if they are being bullied, or know someone else who is, they should tell a trusted adult.
8. Never click on any links that are contained in emails from people they don't know. As well as sexual content, they could contain a computer virus.
9. If you suspect your child has been contacted by a predator, try to save a copy of the chat log (or whatever form the contact takes) for evidence. Call Crime Stoppers 24-hour line 1800 333 000 to make a formal complaint.
10. Your child will be using computers and the technology for the rest of their lives – you're in the great position of being able to get them off to a safe, positive start.

This week the Wellbeing Team is focusing on strategies promoted by the Bullying No Way! Take a Stand Together campaign.



Our school constantly aims to create a safe and supportive school community for everyone.

Sometimes it can be difficult for parents or carers to know what to do when their child talks to them about bullying.

You are an important part of our work to prevent bullying and to respond effectively if it happens.

Stopping bullying involves everyone.

Bullying – what can you do?

If it happens in person:

- ignore them
- tell them to stop and then walk away
- pretend you don't care
- go somewhere safe
- get support from your friends.

If it happens online:

- avoid responding to the bullying
- block and report anyone who is bullying online
- protect yourself online – use privacy settings and keep records.

If you see someone being bullied:

- leave negative online conversations – don't join in
- support others being bullied.

If it doesn't stop:

- talk to an adult (parent, teacher) who can help stop the bullying
- keep asking for support until the bullying stops.

LAUREN'S NOT HORISING AROUND

Each year the Mounted Branch of the Victoria Police Force accept between six to ten work experience students each year and this year I was fortunate enough to be one of them, doing my work placement last week at the complex in Attwood, which is also shared with the Victoria Police Dog Squad. A bonus of both the Mounted Branch and the Dog Squad sharing the same facilities meant that I was also given a tour of the Dog Squad area and allowed to meet and pat (and get licked by!) some of the dogs and was able to learn more about their training. Not that I was ever planning on it, but I don't think I'll ever run from the police now that I know their dogs are trained to attack at the end of a chase (and they look like they might eat humans for breakfast)!

An important role of the Mounted Branch is to conduct patrols in the city in areas of high volume crime and provide police presence at potentially violent events such as demonstrations and protests, sporting events, music festivals and large celebrations. While I was there members attended a Trump rally that was being held and as well as a march held for International Women's

Day to ensure that there wasn't any violence. Another key role of the Mounted Branch is to conduct land searches, which I also witnessed during my placement. The increased visibility from the height of being on horseback and the greater mobility of horses as opposed to being on foot or in a vehicle means that horses are ideal for this purpose and the Mounted Branch form an integral part of searches. The Mounted Branch also plays a representative role at some events such as funerals, which I saw while I was there, with two officers and their mounts attending the funeral of a high-ranking police officer and helping to form a guard of honour.

A day at the Mounted Branch typically began with a morning briefing at 7:00am to catch everybody up on any events that may have happened overnight and establish what is on for the day ahead, particularly who is riding what horses and if there are any extra things on that particular day such as training sessions or searches. Most of the police officers have a specific horse assigned to them to ride and care for, which get ridden during the day for exercise, training or when conducting a patrol. During the course of the week there were multiple training sessions, particularly for new horses deemed 'Training Horses' who have not yet been accepted permanently into the police force and are being trialled to determine whether or not they will become troop horses. Around one in ten horses complete this trial period and are accepted as troop horses, with the others being returned to their owners. As a Work Experience student, each work day went for eight hours and some of the daily jobs I helped with included cleaning out the stables of the horses who had been kept in the stalls overnight, making the feeds for the next day, feeding the horses, cleaning and putting away

the saddlery after the officers had ridden as well as general cleaning and organising. Additionally, I was also lucky enough to witness training sessions, lessons, live band practice (yes, involving horses!) and preparation routines for demonstrations.

A significant highlight of my time spent with the Victoria Police Force was the people with whom I worked. All of them were so incredibly lovely and willing to speak about their experiences and answer all of my questions. This allowed me to gain an insight into the job that I otherwise never would have received.

I found the whole experience to be extremely eye-opening and enlightening, not only surrounding the general things such as the day-to-day operations, but also as to the essential role that the police officers play in our society (they truly deal with many of the worst things that happen in life) and the strength and resilience police officers collectively need to possess in order to 'see people at their worst', as one officer put it.

I encourage everybody to fully participate in Work Experience and seize the opportunity to truly experience the job and learn from the people in it, even if you have already done Work Experience before like I had (at GV Health). If an opportunity comes up that you are interested in, I encourage you to pursue it. I think it's an opportunity for learning in so many different areas that you are unlikely to regret. Additionally, asking plenty of questions on your work experience is the best way to learn, as people often don't talk straight off the bat about the things you are interested to know; however, there is absolutely no harm in asking and this is what began the most interesting conversations I had while I was away.

WHERE ARE THEY NOW?

During my time at SMOTA I was very interested in Art and Graphics but was always leaning more towards Art. To be honest I didn't really care about grades or my VCE score as I didn't really know what I wanted to do when I left school. It made me nervous to think about what I was going to do for the rest of my life. My attitude and commitment to VCE was reflected in my score of 44.

After school, I started a job in Nathalia at a farm supply store and realised very quickly that this was not what I wanted to do. I applied to do a Diploma in Building Design and Technology at TAFE's in Geelong, which I finished two years later. Towards the end of my TAFE course I applied for a Bachelor of Architecture at Deakin University and got accepted. Due to my scores and technical skills learnt at TAFE, I went straight into 2nd year of Architecture and received a year and a half worth of credits for previous experience. The style of TAFE's education method also meant I had a much greater understanding of construction and software than my classmates at uni. Over the next two years I graduated with a Bachelor of Architecture and moved into a Masters of Architecture for the following two years. When I was studying in Geelong I was fortunate enough to get a job at a small boutique architecture firm and this helped my studies more than anything.

In 2014, I graduated with my Masters in Architecture and had been offered a job at Grimshaw Architects in Melbourne. Grimshaw is one of the most highly respected firms in the world with offices in London, New York, Melbourne, Sydney and Kuala Lumpur. I had the pleasure of working on some truly great and extremely difficult projects all over the world including: one of the largest airports in the world, one of the largest rail infrastructure projects in Victorian history, and even a small convention centre in Papua New Guinea.

In Architecture my main role was creating 3D models of designs to assist in the design of the buildings, which meant I had to know how to use the software to produce a model very quickly. Towards the end of my 2nd year at Grimshaw I wanted to move into a 3D Artist role within



the company and made the transition in 2016 to be a 3D Visualisation Artist. It is now my job to take the design of a building and build a highly detailed 3D model which I will then use to produce a highly-detailed photo real image which can be shown to the clients.

The best advice I could give to a student in high school today is that it's ok if you don't have a plan just now for what you want to do. Also it's not the end of the world if you don't get the results that you were hoping for. There will always be options for you to get where you want, it just may take a little longer than you thought. For me that was going to TAFE and studying drafting before going into Architecture and then finally transitioning into 3D visualisation. For you it may be similar, or it may be completely different.

Pi (Greek letter “ π ”) is the symbol used in mathematics to represent a constant — the ratio of the circumference of a circle to its diameter — which is approximately 3.14159.

The day was celebrated in a variety of ways. Maths teachers came to school proudly wearing their Pi t-shirts. There were one Pi symbol hidden in each homeroom for a lucky student to find. These were brought to student reception at recess for a prize. There were a junior, intermediate and senior maths quiz which could be completed in teams of three and were hotly contested.

Lunchtime saw the pi challenge — how many digits does any one student have memorized? The frisbee throwing competition began with students required to measure the circumference and diameter of the Frisbee and attempt to calculate Pi. Do you have an interest in Science and are currently studying Science subjects?

Year 11 students are invited to apply for the National Youth Science Forum in January 2018. Applications are open NOW and close on 31st May 2017.

Two of our current Year 12 students, Olivia Brunskill and Mikaela Wood, attended the NYSF in January this year after successful applications last year and from all accounts had a fantastic experience.

Attending NYSF is a unique opportunity for young Australian Science students in Year 11 in 2017 to participate in Australia's leading Science and Technology outreach activity. In the January before entering Year 12, the participants will experience 12 days of Science and Technology related activities, designed to encourage them to continue to study in these fields, and move on to careers that are so important in underpinning the Australian economy.

In 2018, two sessions will be run consecutively at The Australian National University in Canberra, providing 400 places. One session will be run at The University of Queensland, providing up to 200 places. Dates for the three sessions are:

Session A – Canberra – Tues 2 – Sat 13 January 2018

Session B – Brisbane – Tues 9 – Sat 20 January 2018

Session C – Canberra – Tues 16 – Sat 27 January 2018
